The Context After the Independence of India, a gradual decline in the moral integrity of the society as a whole, a slow poisoning of the youth psyche by the glitter egocentric pleasures, a clouded wisdom of the elders unable to show the path of strength and peace is undoubtedly evident to any careful observer. Time is ripe enough to save the youth, the future citizens from a disastrous tragedy. 4. The Practice Practices: • First of all the very ambience of the Institution instills orderliness and calmness in one and all • A number of programmes are arranged to expose the students to the ideals of Indian Culture and Spirituality with a background of Universalism as propounded by the great lives and teachings of Shri Ramakrishna, Holy Mother Shri Sarada Devi and Swami Vivekananda.
